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Introduction

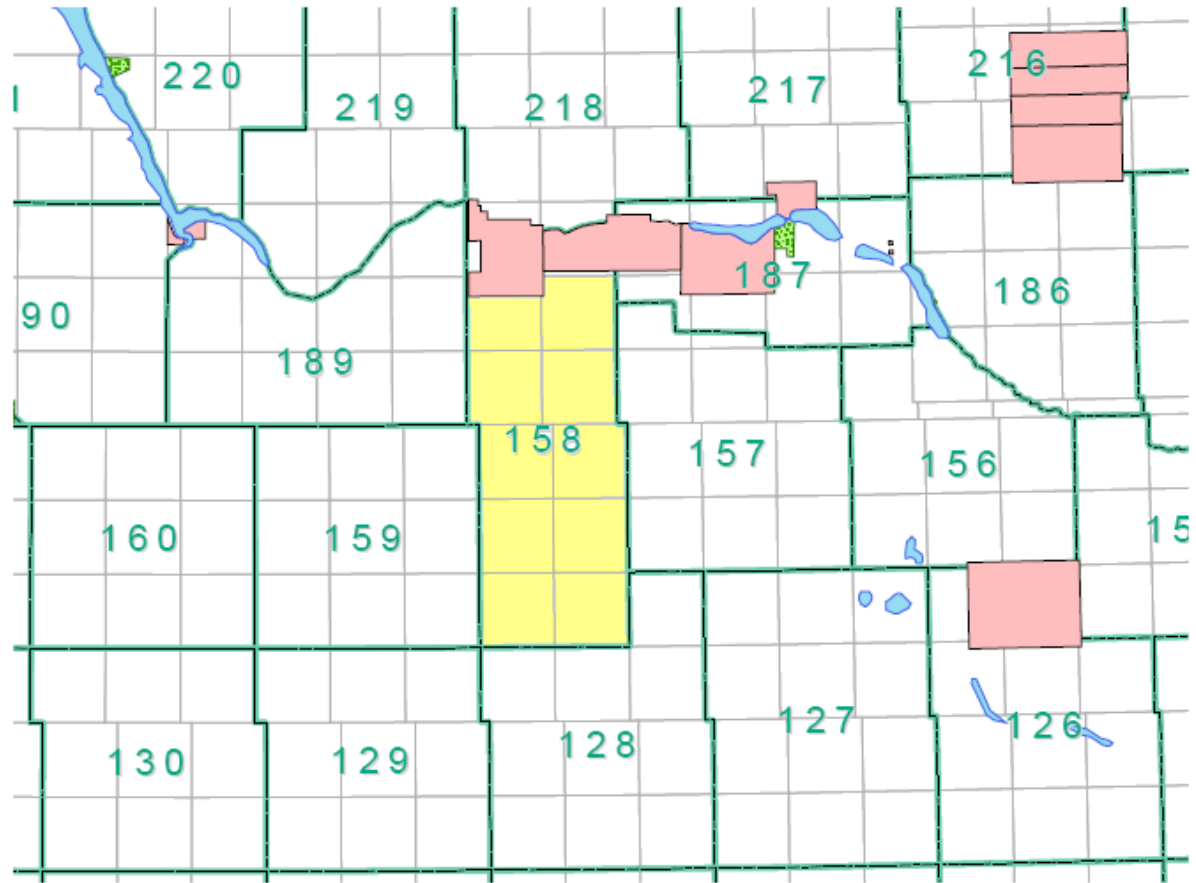
The following statistical information is from the 2006 Census as collected by Statistics Canada and is intended to provide a general socio-economic background for the research and development of an updated land use plan for the **Rural Municipality of Edenwold #158**.

In addition, while the scope of the Study Area includes the Rural Municipality of Edenwold and several other urban municipalities (Town of Pilot Butte, Town of White City, Town of Balgonie, Village of Edenwold and the Emerald Park subdivision within the RM of Edenwold) the primary objective of this planning research is for the Rural Municipality of Edenwold.

Socio-economic profiles for a Study Area can provide insight into the characteristics of the general population and assist in the identification of issues and in the development of appropriate municipal policy. It should be noted that the rapid increase in population numbers within the Study Area will render some of the presented information as slightly dated. Nevertheless, the type of housing development in 2007 and 2008 is similar to the past and the general characteristics of the Study Area should remain relatively constant.

The following profile elements are intended to highlight characteristics of the Study Area and to stimulate thought and debate leading to policy development to prevent, promote and/or modify issues and events within the jurisdiction of the Rural Municipality of Edenwold.

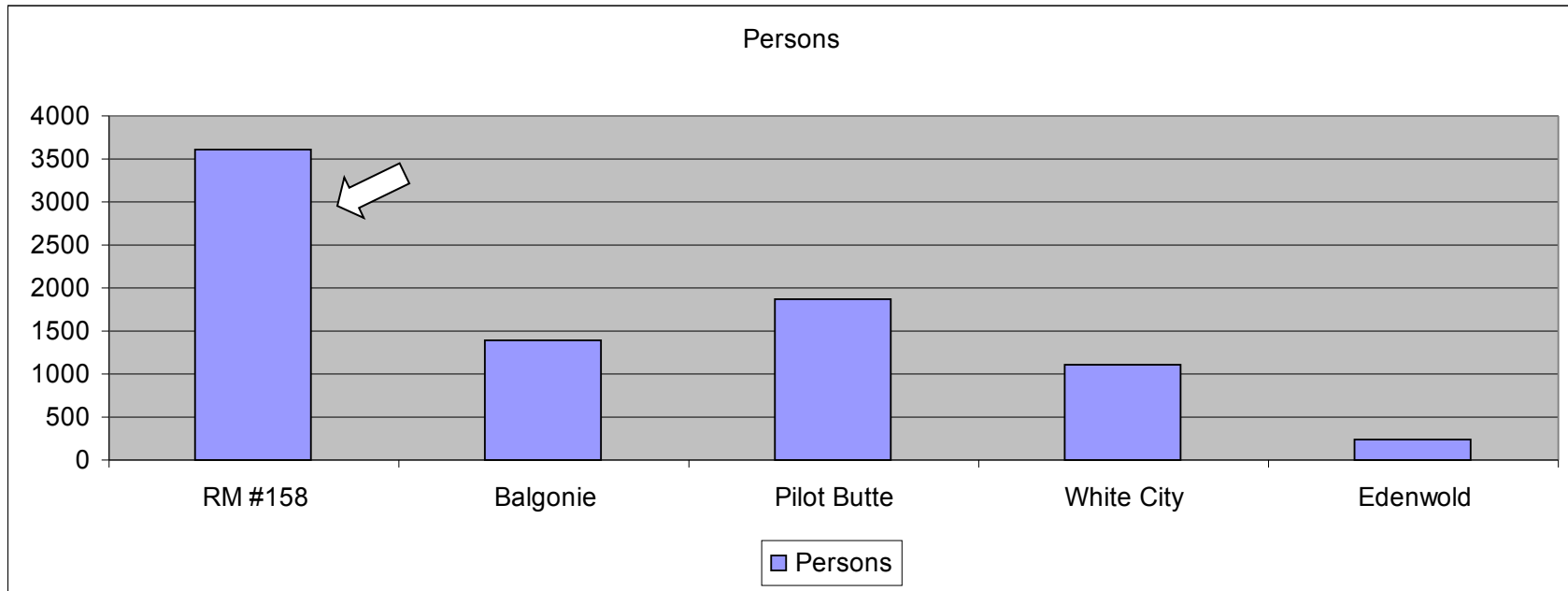
Rural Municipality of Edenwold #158 – Study Area

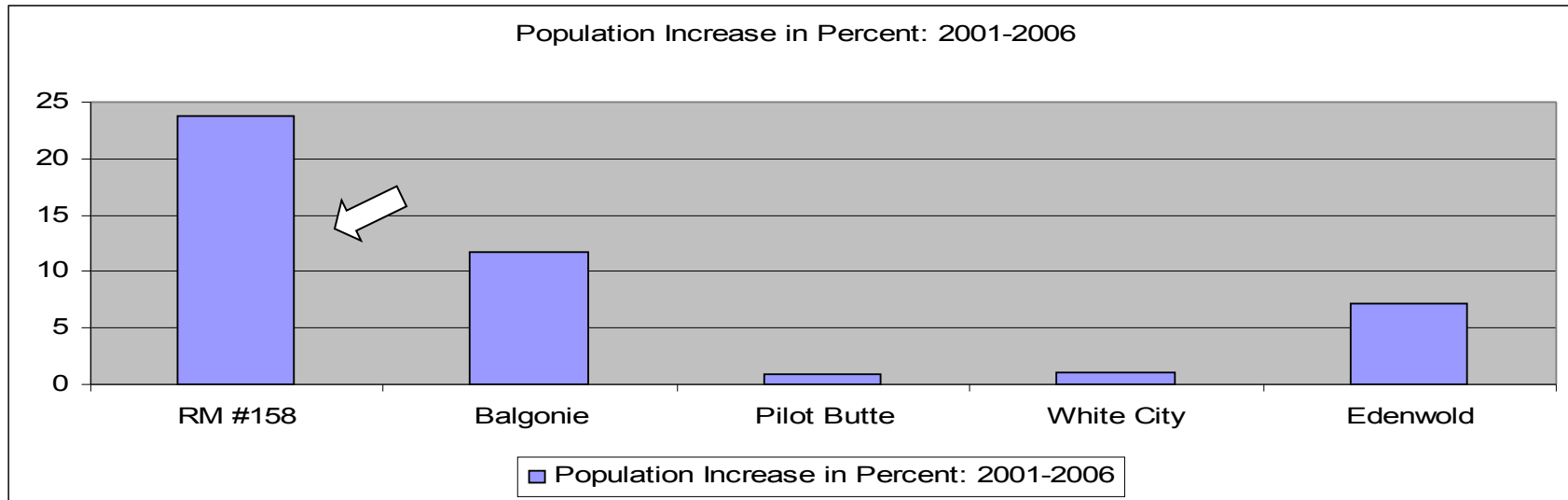

Municipal Populations – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



- The 2006 Study Area municipal population was 8,217 persons
- RM of Edenwold is the dominant municipality with 44 % of total Study Area population
- RM of Edenwold population comes from regular farming and the rapid growth in country residential development
- Emerald Park Subdivision is included in the RM of Edenwold population numbers
- Town of Pilot Butte is second largest urban development (23%) but is being challenged by the Town of Balgonie (17%)
- Much of the population base is directly linked to employment in the adjoining city of Regina to the west

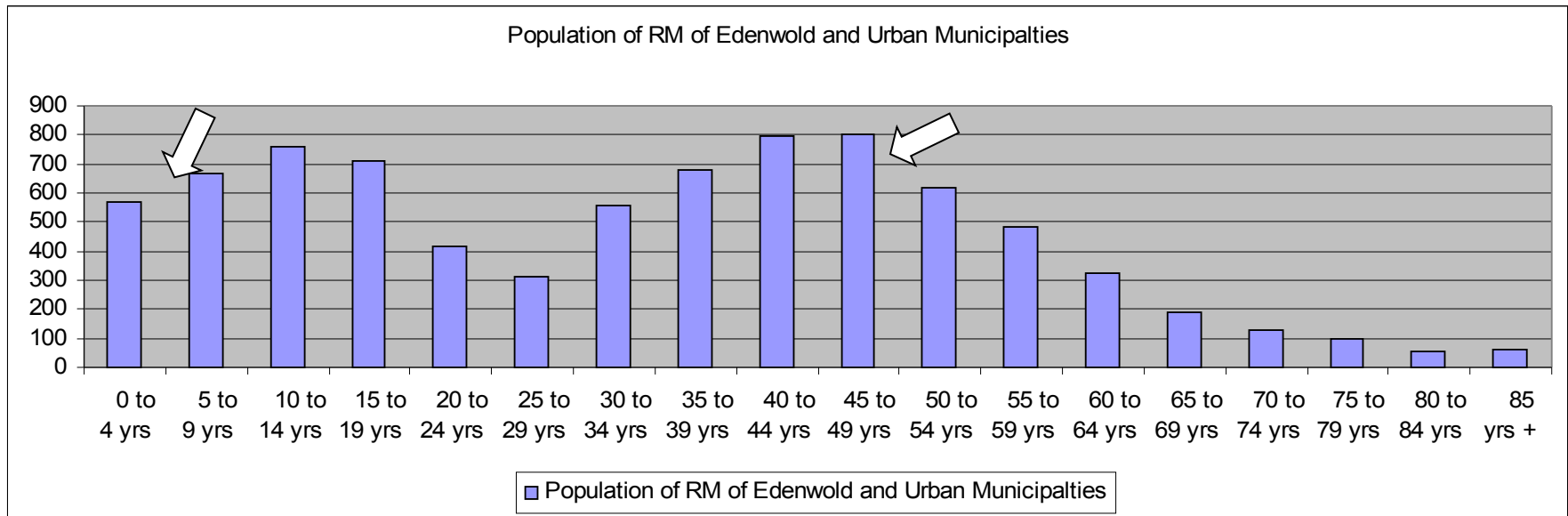
Population Increase by Percent – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



- RM of Edenwold population had largest increase at almost 24 percent over 5 years
- Town of Balgonie increased by almost 12 percent during same period
- Town of Pilot Butte and Town of White City reported very modest increases of 0.9% and 1.1% respectively over 5 years
- Village of Edenwold percentage increase resulted in only 226 to 242 persons – not significant in total numbers
- Strong population increases in RM of Edenwold and Town of Balgonie may create infrastructure problems
- Slow growth in Pilot Butte and White City may have reflected a lack of land available for development
- Major new residential development is proposed for the northern section of Pilot Butte – could have significant population impact
- Significant population growth is also occurring in the Town of White City since 2006

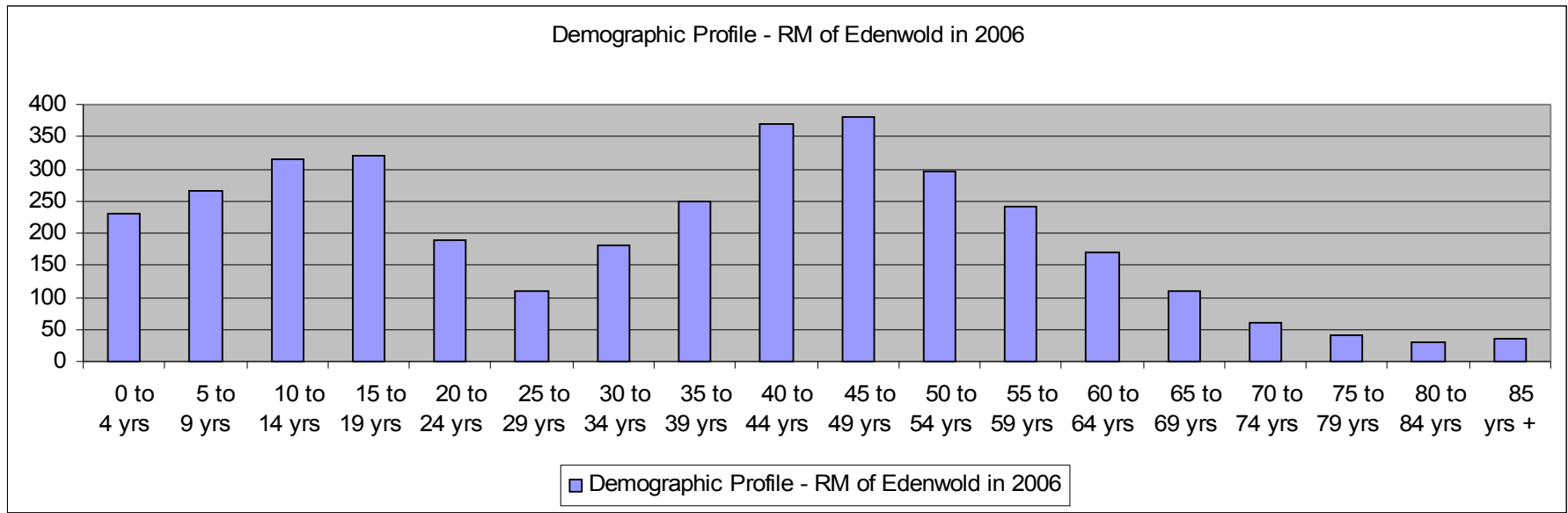
Demographic Profile – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census

The combined demographic profile for the Study Area (RM of Edenwold, Town of Pilot Butte, Town of White City, Town of Balgonie, Village of Edenwold and Emerald Park Subdivision), based on the 2006 Canada Census, is presented below. Actual numbers have been rounded to the nearest 5 for privacy protection in smaller urban centres – this masks some of the minor variations in the statistics.



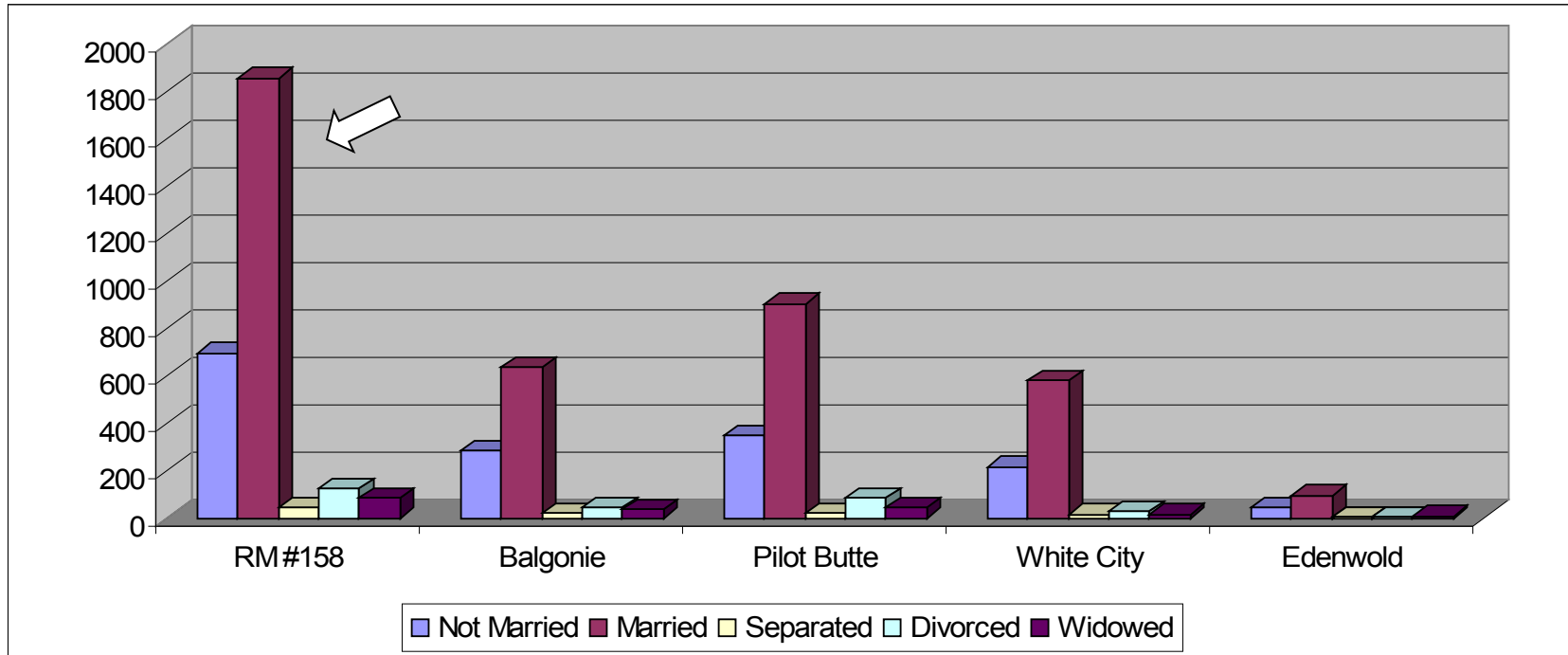
- Largest population age cohort is in the prime income earning years of 35-59 years of age
- Strong youth population in the 5-19 year age cohort, however, a decline in the youngest age group 0-4 years
- Lower number of persons in the 20-29 year age cohort: migration out of community for education, jobs and lack of rental
- Relatively small aged population for a typical Saskatchewan small town and rural farming municipality
- General profile is not typical of a farming-based rural municipality – this region is within the Regina commuter-shed
- Increase in number of persons over 69 years of age can be expected over the next 15-20 years
- What percent of seniors will remain in Study Area with only a choice of single-detached housing?
- Elementary school enrolments should be monitored based on first in-migration and general population increase

Demographic Profile – RM of Edenwold – 2006 Census



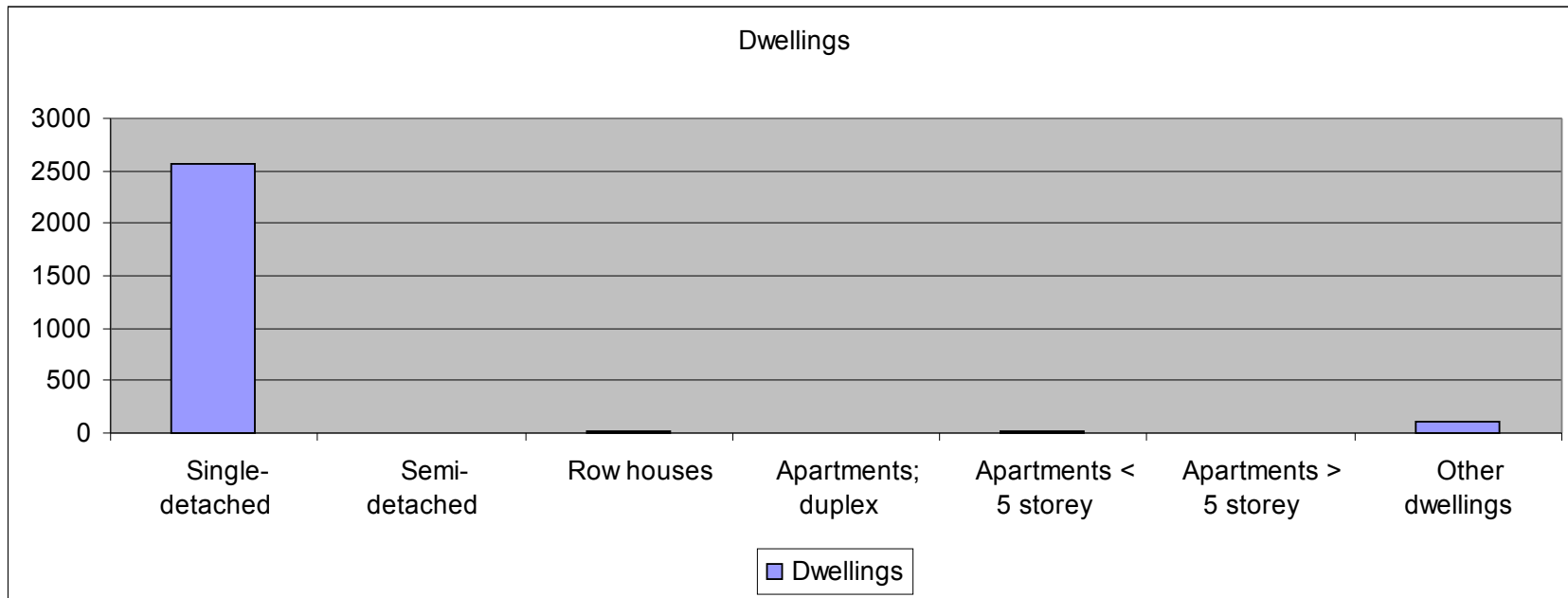
- RM of Edenwold is the dominant municipality in the Study Area in terms of size and in terms of percentage growth
- RM of Edenwold demographic profile similar to most other municipalities in Study Area – only larger numbers
- Largest population age cohort is in the prime income earning years of 35-59 years of age – linked to housing type
- Strong youth population in the 5-19 year age cohort, however, a decline in the youngest age group 0-4 years
- Lower number of persons in the 20-34 year age cohort: migration and lack of rental accommodation in municipality
- Relatively small aged population for a typical Saskatchewan small rural farming municipality
- General profile is not typical of a farming-based rural municipality – this region is within the Regina commuter-shed
- Increase in number of persons over 69 years of age can be expected over the next 15-20 years
- What percent of seniors will remain in Study Area with only a choice of single-detached housing?
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Marital Status – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



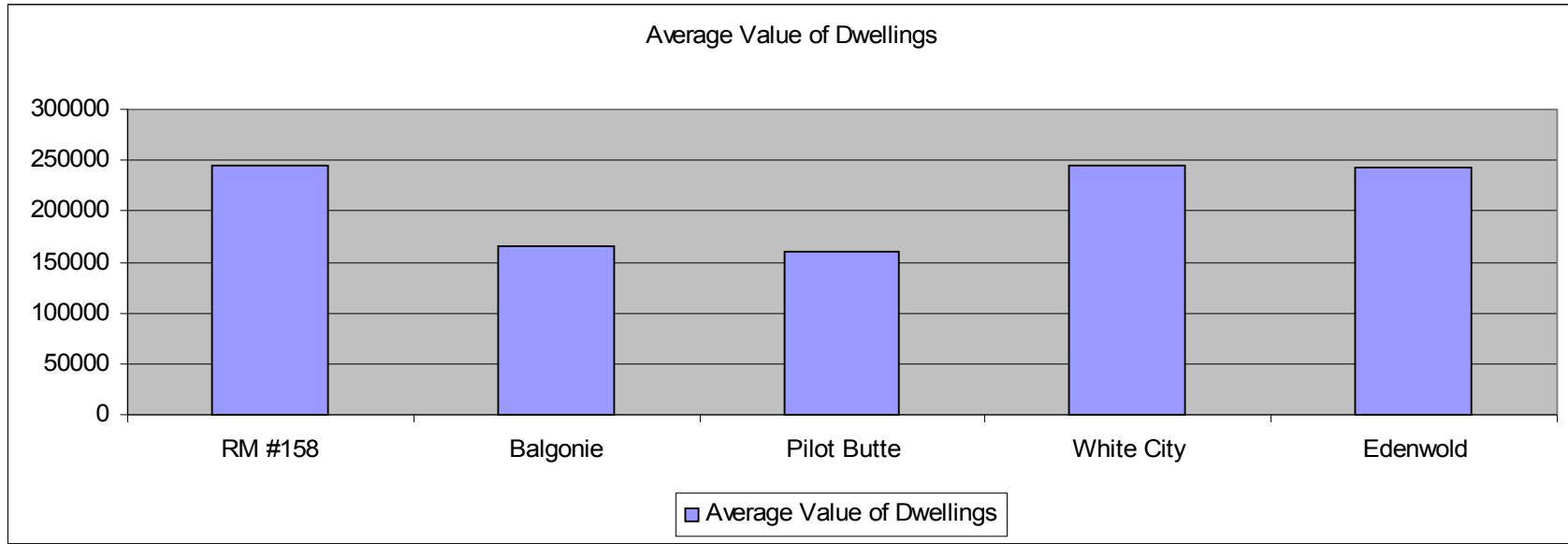
- Married households predominate throughout Study Area – highest in RM of Edenwold
- Single, never married percentage highest in Balgonie and White City – not significant
- Separated persons and divorced persons not significant in Study Area – movement to Regina?
- Study Area profile strongly suggests married couples in single-detached housing in country residential setting
- Trend most likely to continue in medium term

Dwelling Type Profile - RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



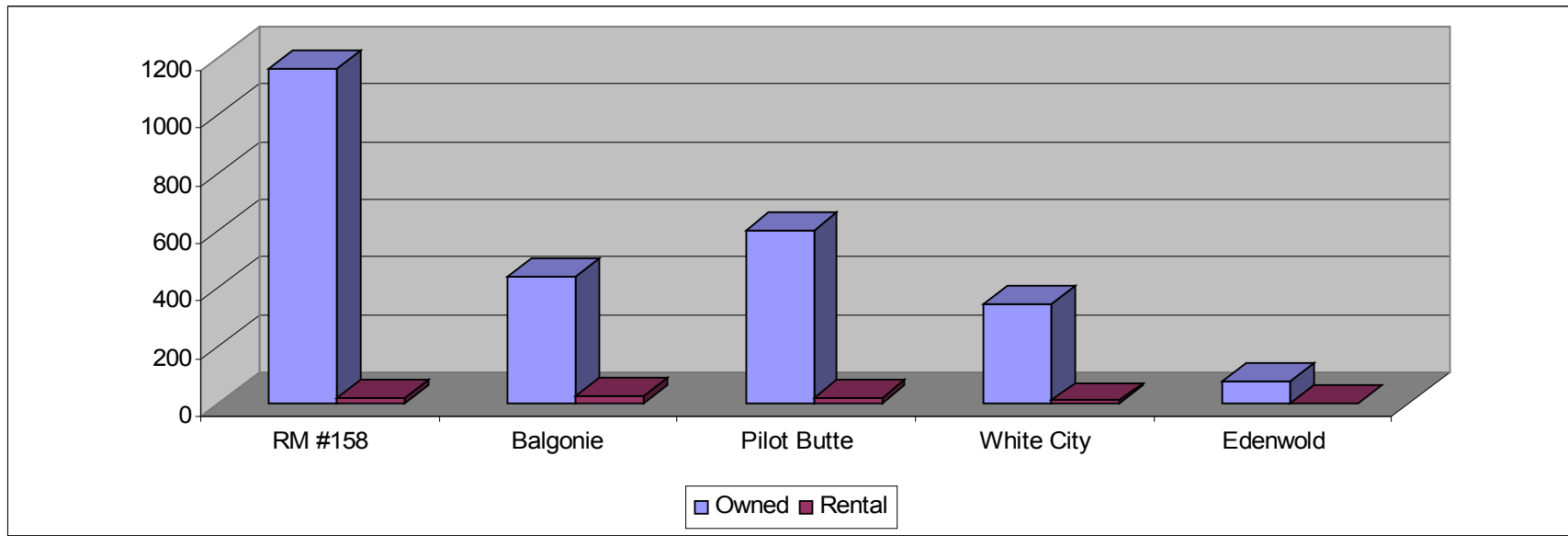
- Study Area almost exclusively single-detached – country residential and rural characteristic
- Balgonie and Pilot Butte offering very modest options for Other Dwellings
- “Bedroom” community profile with most customers wanting single detached housing units
- Limited current demand for apartments and condominiums – future option for consideration
- Opportunity for Pilot Butte, White City and Balgonie to offer more rental and seniors housing in future
- Study Area should expect future clusters of multi-unit condominium development over next 20 years
- Dwelling types may change with escalating oil and natural gas prices
- Dwelling types may change with aging of general population in the Study Area

Average Value of Dwellings - RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



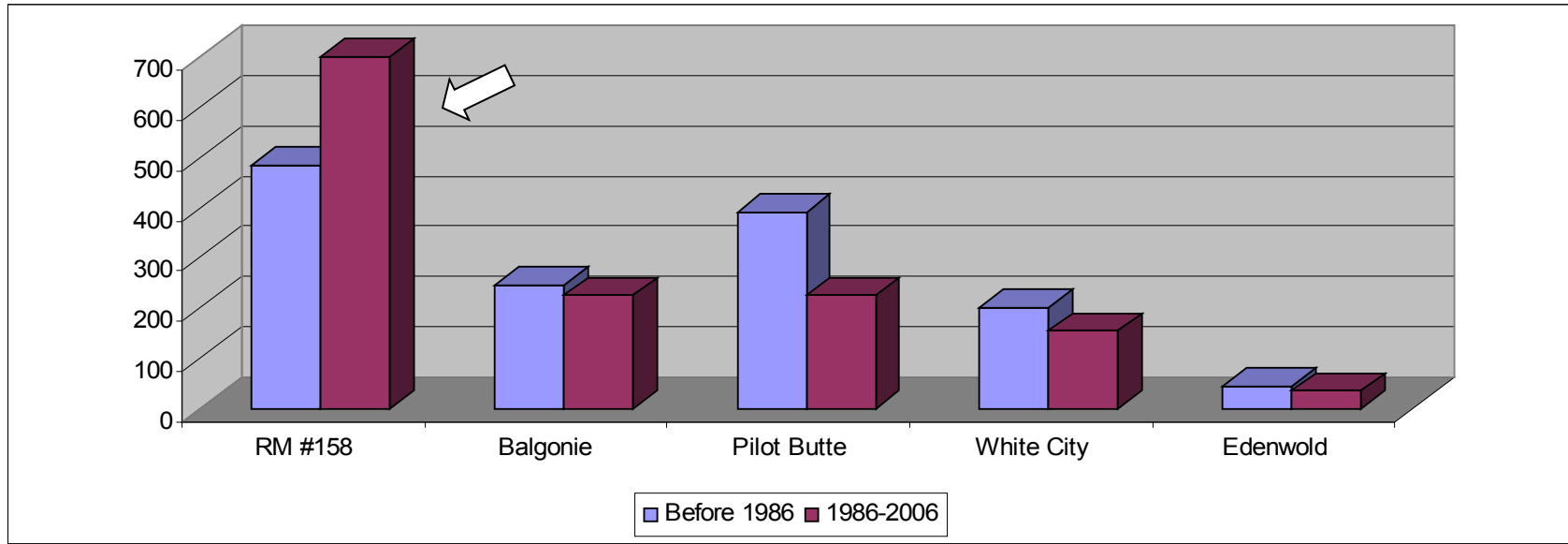
- Average Value of Study Area almost exclusively upper middle income single-detached – well above average price
- Current 2008 real estate prices significantly higher than 2006 Census numbers
- Balgonie and Pilot Butte have the lowest housing values (still high in Saskatchewan)
- Village of Edenwold average house prices are a surprise – more research required on this statistic
- Should the Study Area consider a wider range of more affordable housing for district residents?
- How will rapid price increases affect future country residential development in the Study Area?
- How will traffic congestion on Highway #1 – East Victoria Avenue impact future growth in the Study Area?

Dwelling Ownership Profile – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



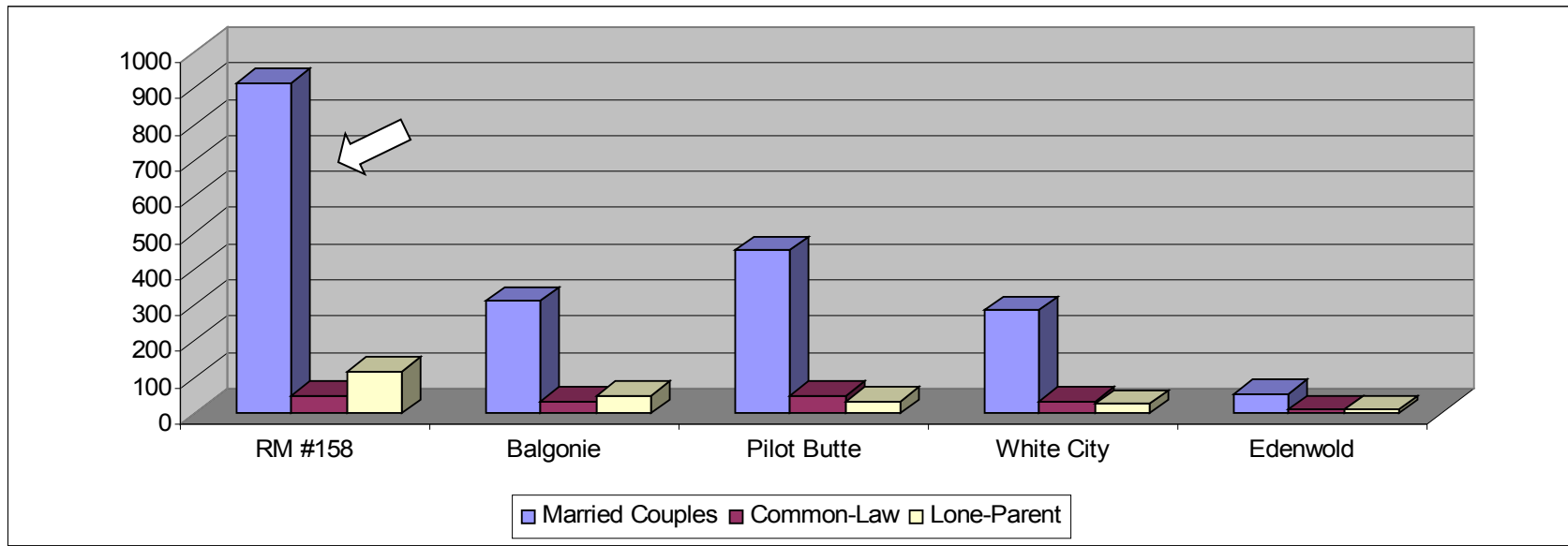
- Dwelling ownership is predominate in the Study Area – very little rental property
- Single detached country residential is most common format for dwelling
- How much land remains available for low density country residential development?
- What land servicing constraints might emerge and affect country residential development over next 10-15 years?
- Does the RM wish to promote more rental properties for aging seniors and younger couples?

Period of House Construction – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



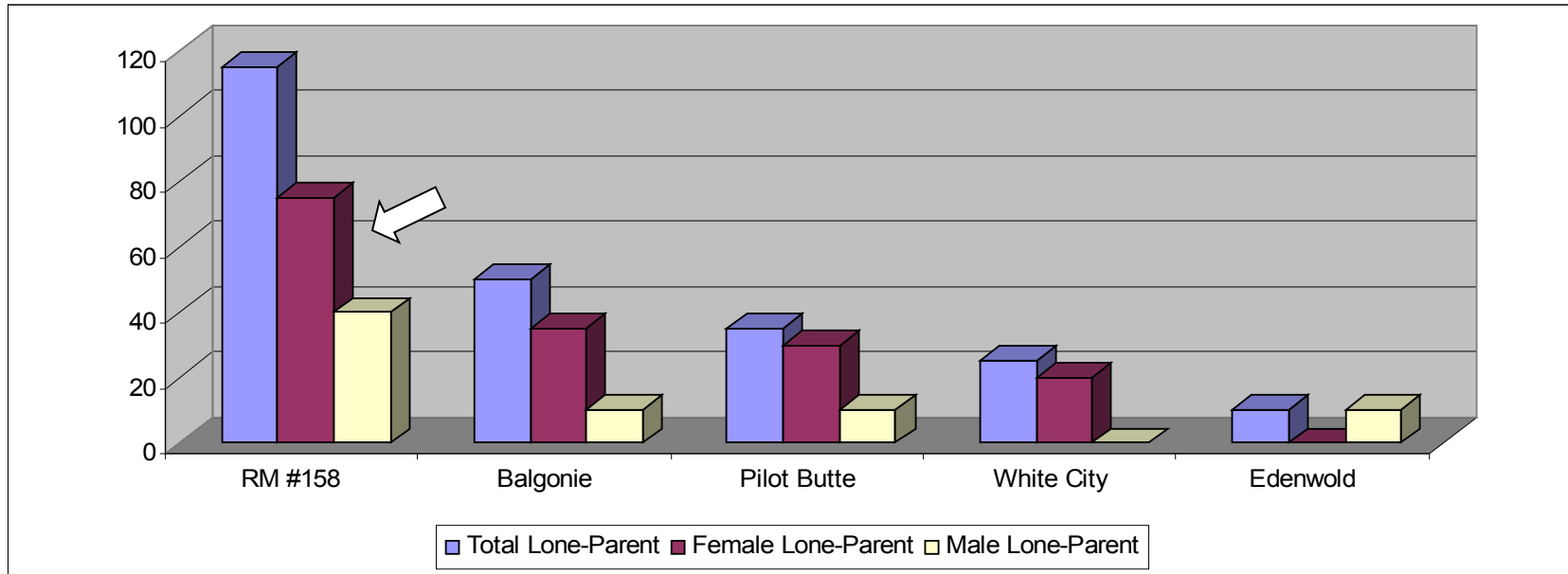
- Period of house construction is largely pre-1986 with exception of RM of Edenwold – strong growth now
- Town of Balgonie has the second highest urban shift to new dwelling construction
- Pilot Butte has highest percentage of pre-1986 housing – slower growth since 1986
- Emerald Park and general country residential development major factor for RM of Edenwold housing growth
- Which municipalities have the greatest potential for house construction over next 10-15 years?

Family Types – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



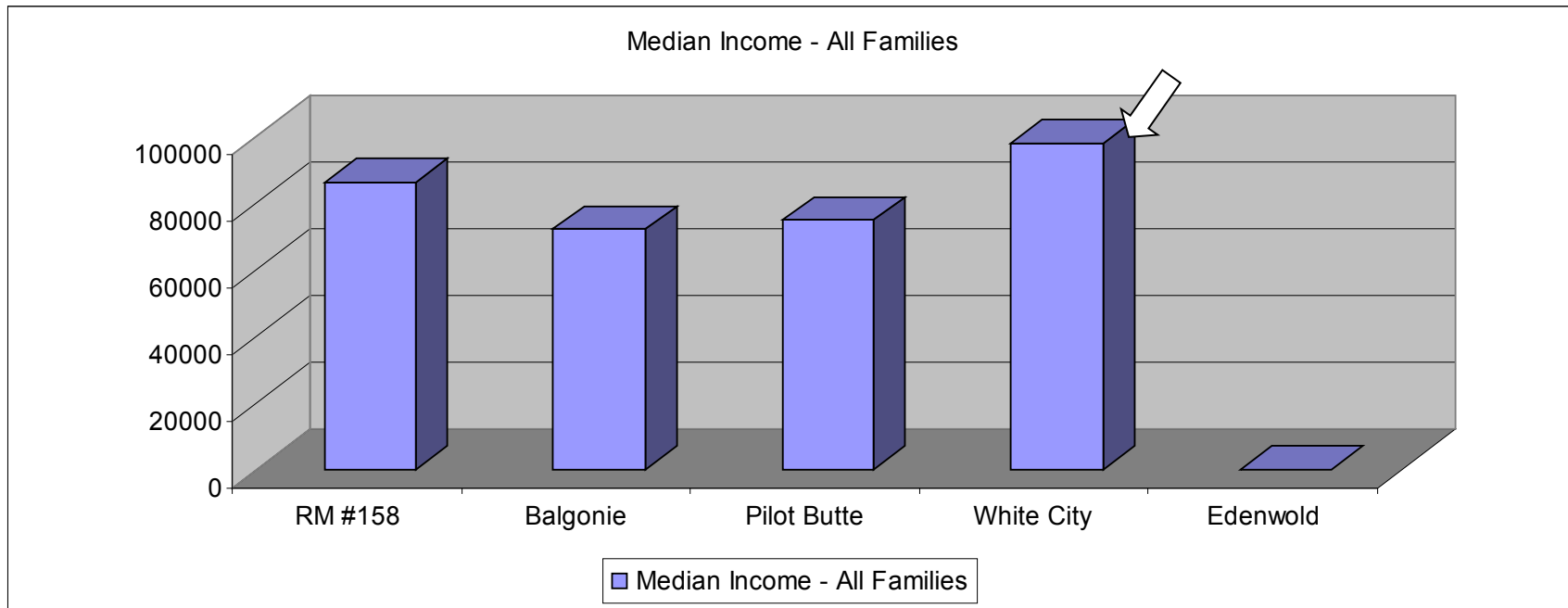
- Married couples is the dominant family type in all municipalities in the Study Area
- Lone-Parent families are highest in the RM of Edenwold – something of a surprise and requires further research
- Family type profile normally expected in an upper-middle income country residential development area
- Few changes expected in the short-term development of the Study Area

Lone Parent Family Profile – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



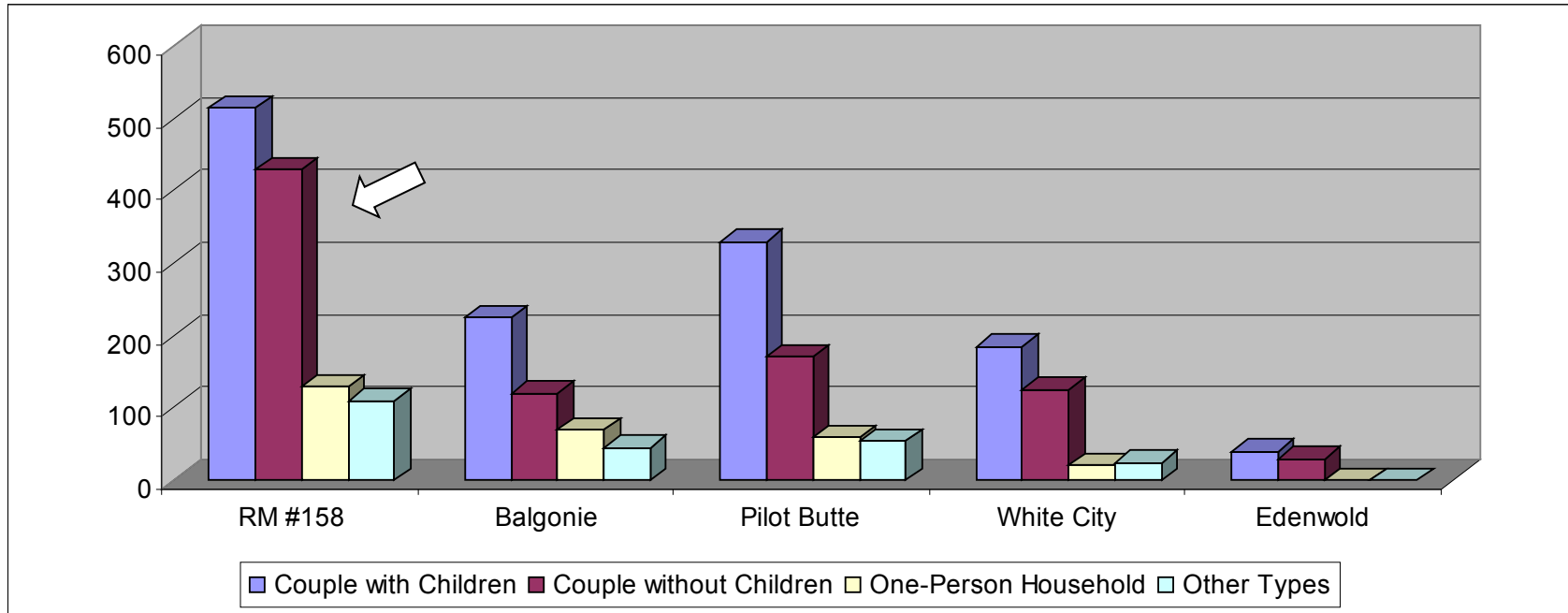
- Lone-parent families represent less than 10 percent of all census families in the Study Area
- RM of Edenwold has the highest number of Lone-parent families
- Female lone-parent families are generally the most common type – exception is Village of Edenwold (small sample)
- Is affordable housing available and necessary in the Study Area for female lone-parent families?

Median Income – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



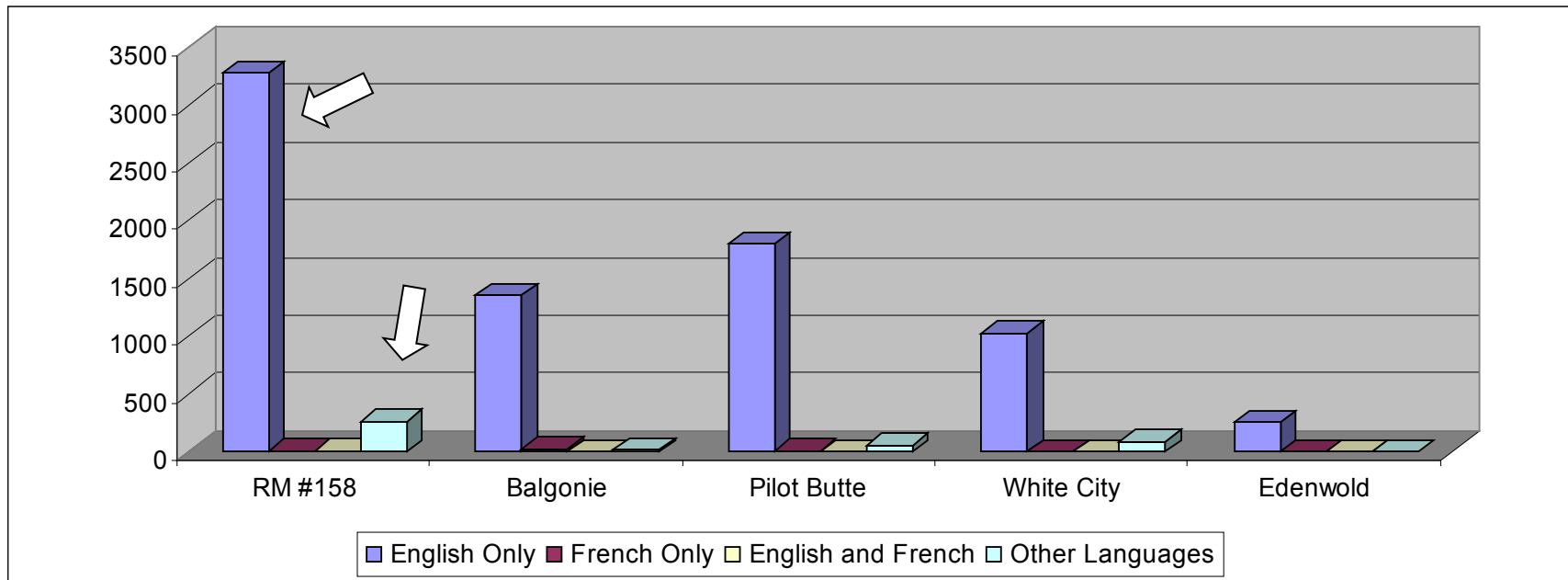
- The Study Area has a high Median family income in comparison with most rural municipalities in Saskatchewan
- Household income sources most likely from Regina – “bedroom” community income profile
- Town of White City has highest median income with Town of Balgonie having lowest
- No data for Village of Edenwold
- High median income reflected in housing type and housing prices in the Study Area
- High incomes expected to persist for next 10-15 years and associated with growing Regina economy

Household Types Including Status of Children – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



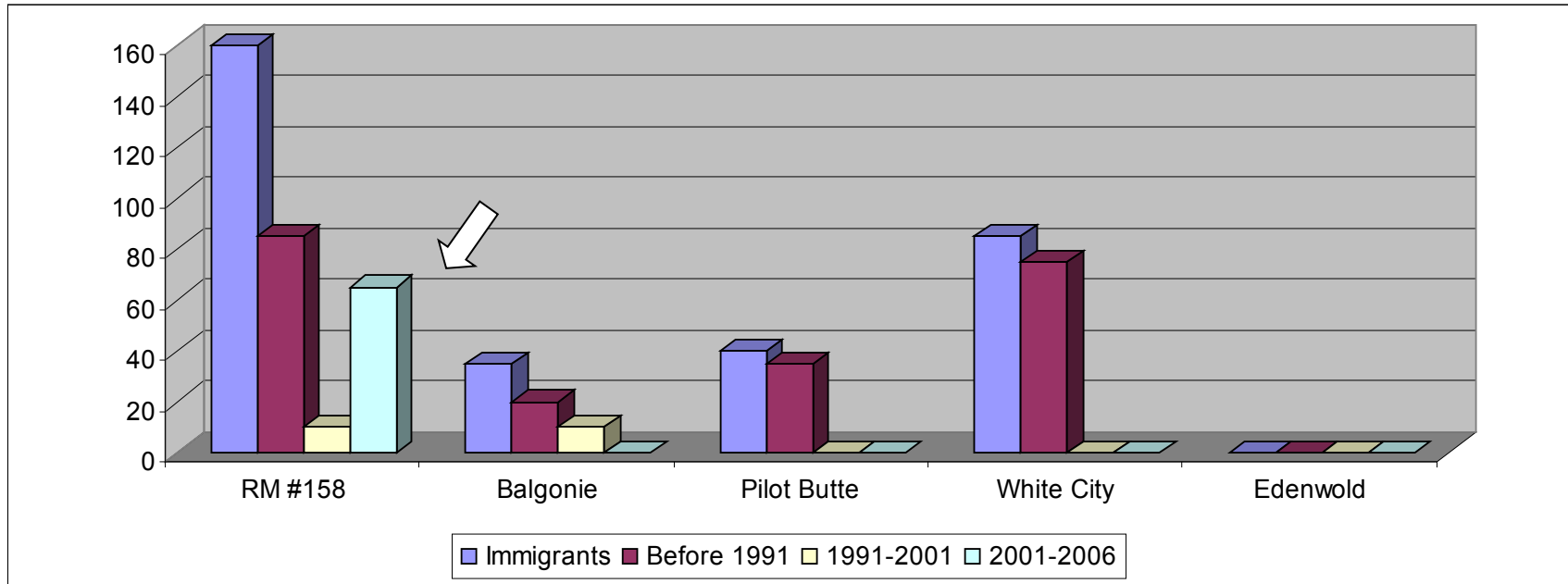
- Couples with Children are dominant household type in all municipalities in Study Area
- Single detached housing, family median income and family formation are factors in current household type
- Near term housing development will extend trend, however, aging population will see more households without children
- RM of Edenwold most likely attractive for younger seniors without children – children leaving home
- Education facilities need to track both in-migration of families with children and natural increase in children
- Does the Study Area wish to promote more country residential living for retirees?

Language Profile – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



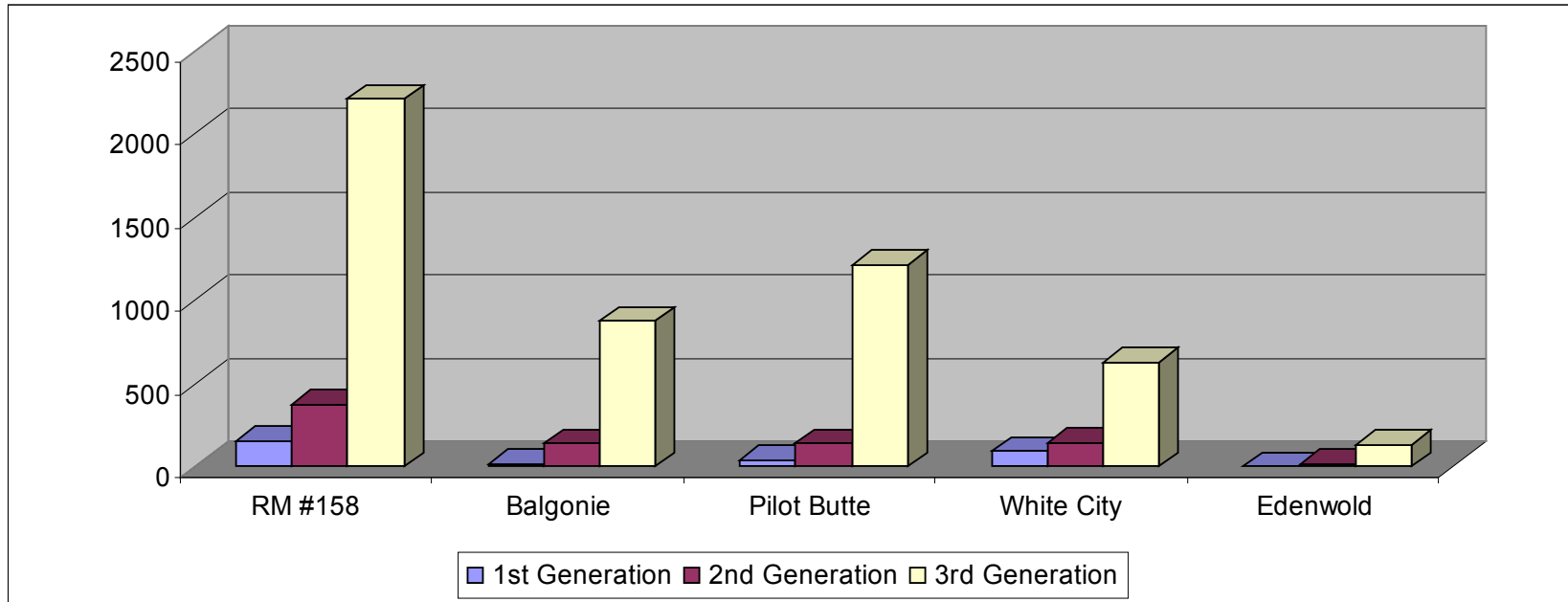
- The Study Area is predominately unilingual English – very little French language or Other Languages spoken
- Study Area will most likely remain predominately English speaking – few cultural or economic reasons to change
- Small linguistic concentration in RM of Edenwold
- Immigration levels will most likely remain low
- Does the Rural Municipality wish to promote other languages in the district?

Immigration Profile – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



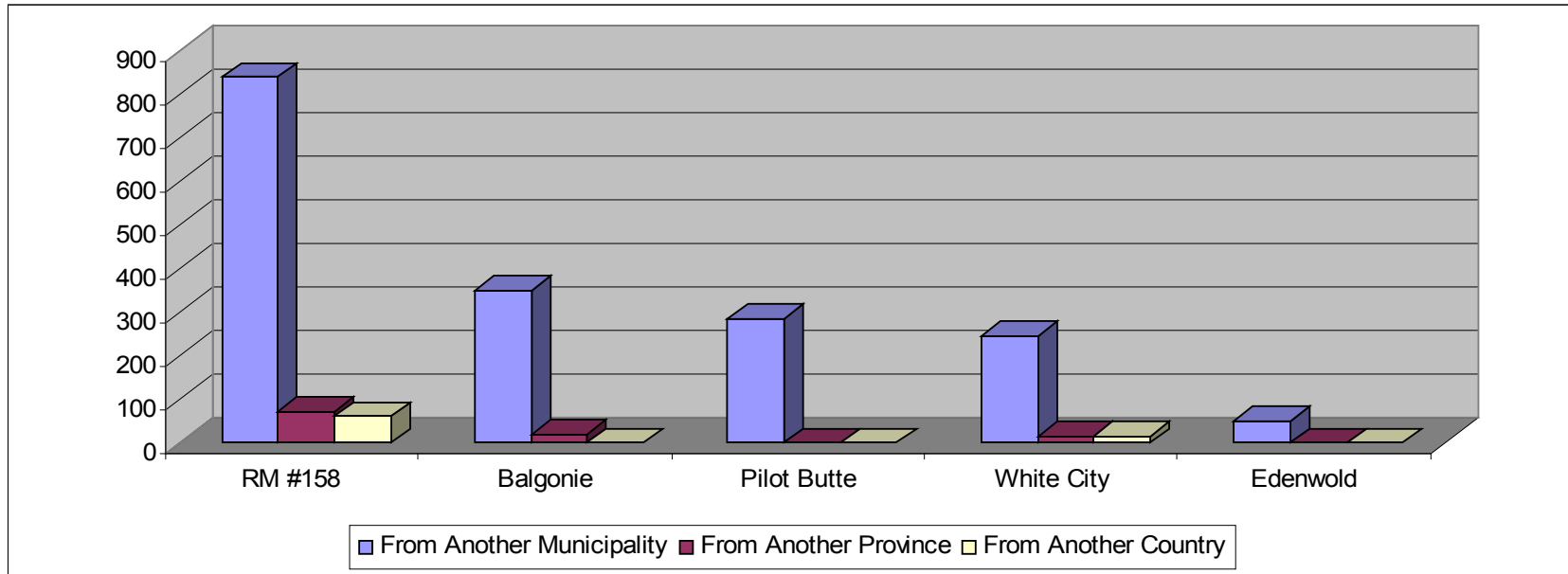
- The Study Area is not attractive for new immigrants to Canada – less than 4% in total numbers
- Very low immigration to district both historically and declining in present times
- Limited immigration should be expected over next 15-20 years
- Does the Study Area wish to promote and encourage more immigration into the district?

Generational Profile of Residents – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



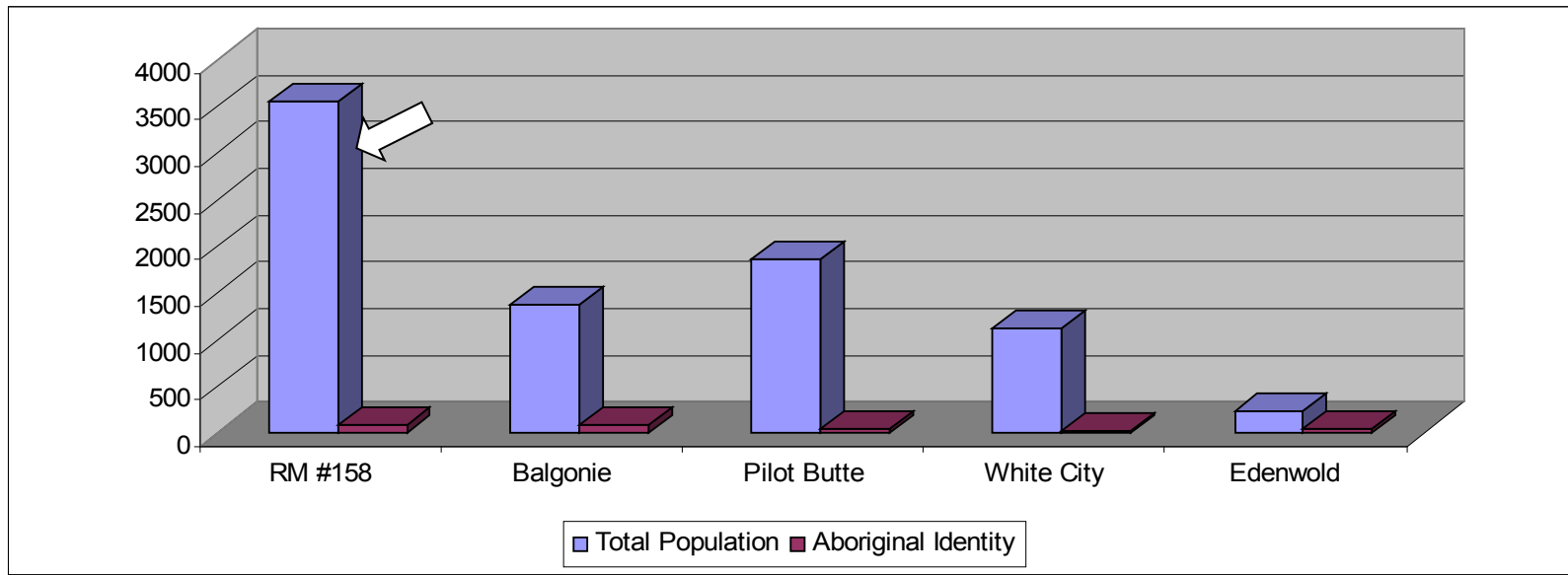
- A large percentage of the 15 year + Study Area residents are 3rd generation residents
- Tradition and social connections – probably strong but may be changing with increased country residential development
- Population growth generally comes from new 1st generation – in migration and birthrate
- Does the Study Area wish to see increased population growth over the next 15-20 years?
- If yes to growth - then where should this population growth be directed within the Study Area?

Five Year Inter-municipal Migration – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



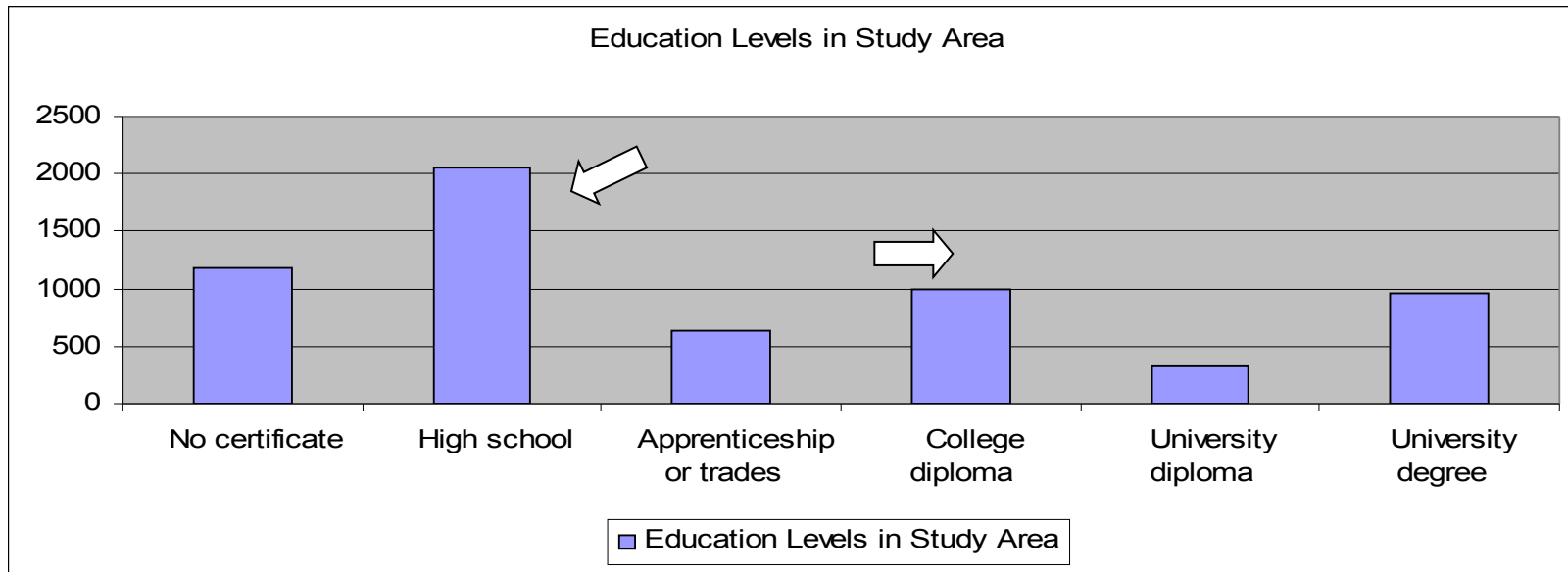
- RM of Edenwold attracting large numbers of persons from other municipalities in Saskatchewan between 2001-2006
- Balgonie, Pilot Butte and White City attracting significant numbers from other municipalities
- Only RM of Edenwold is attracting some inter-provincial and out of country migration – not significant
- Population growth generally comes in-migration and birthrate

Aboriginal Identity – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



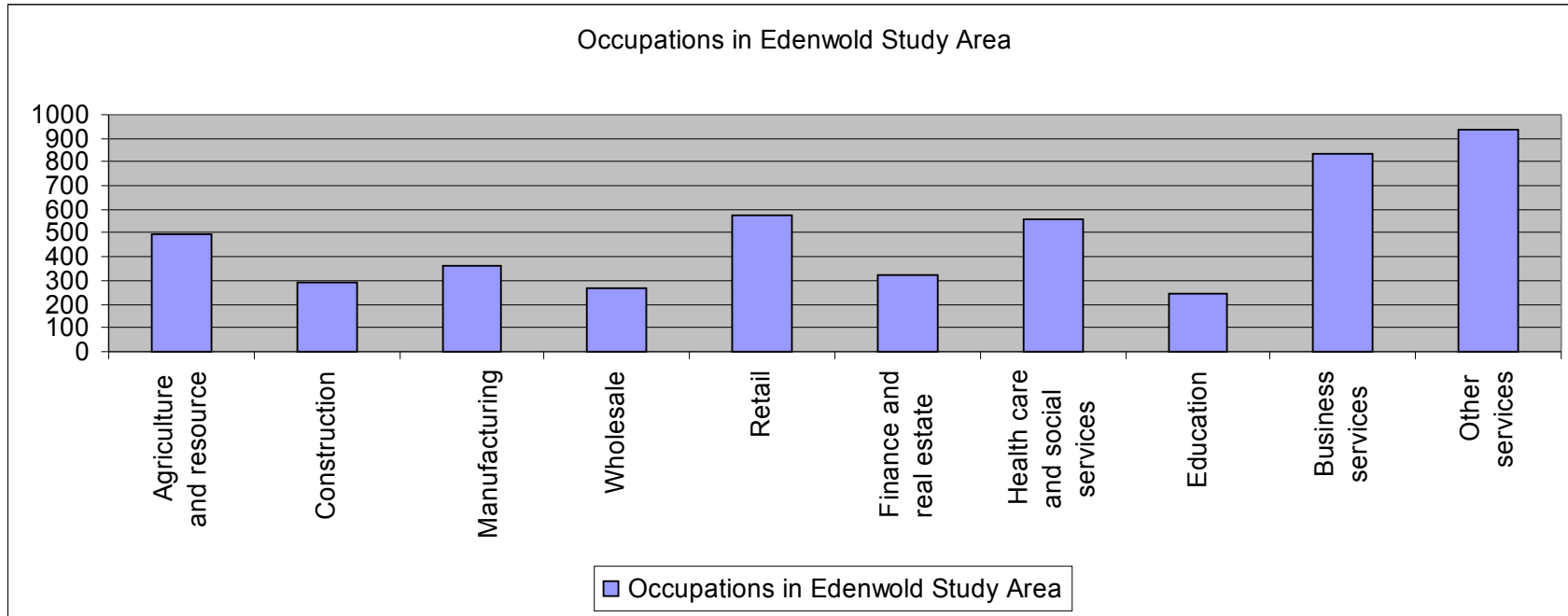
- Aboriginal declaration of identity is very low in Study Area
- Adjacent First Nations Reserves to north most likely accommodate local Aboriginal populations
- Regina offers a greater range of housing and services – limited attraction in Study Area at present
- Commercial Aboriginal development may alter Aboriginal profile in Study Area over next 10 years

Education Levels Completed – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



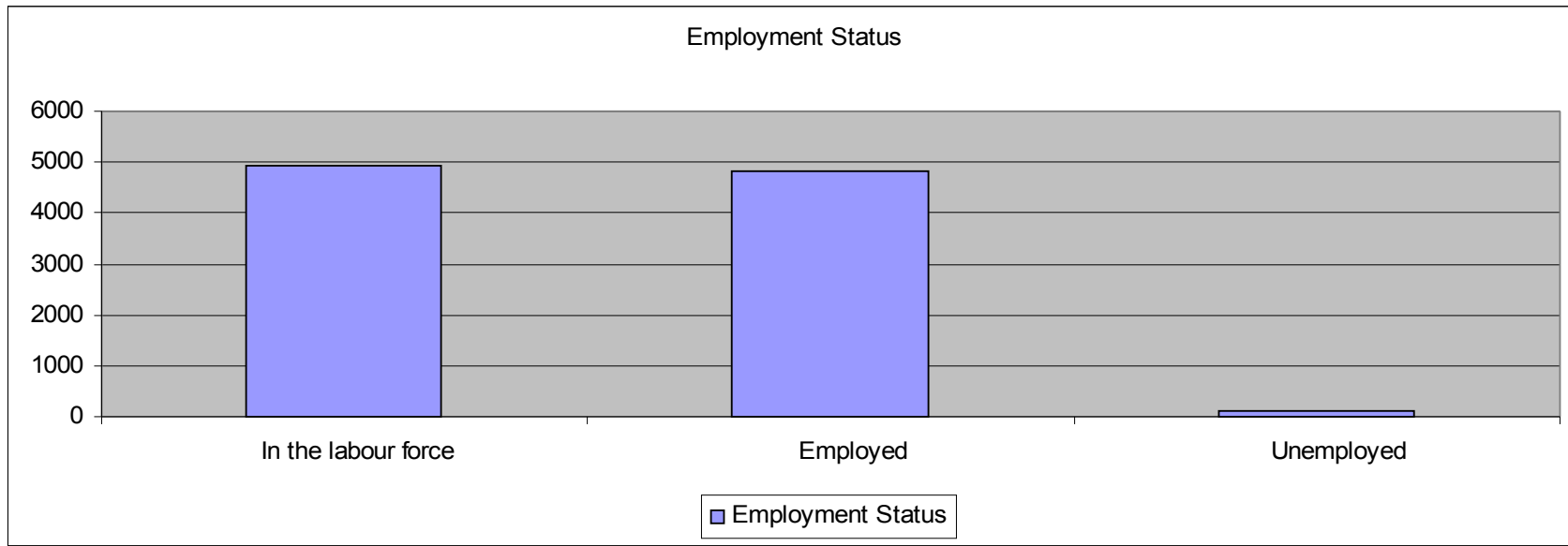
- Study Area education levels more commonly High school, then college diploma and then university degree
- High university level not typical in a traditional Saskatchewan rural municipality – urban commuters to Regina
- Trades education levels also higher – most likely contractors working in Regina and living in region
- Higher education levels indicate impact of the urban “commuter-shed” around the City of Regina

Occupation Profile by Sector – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



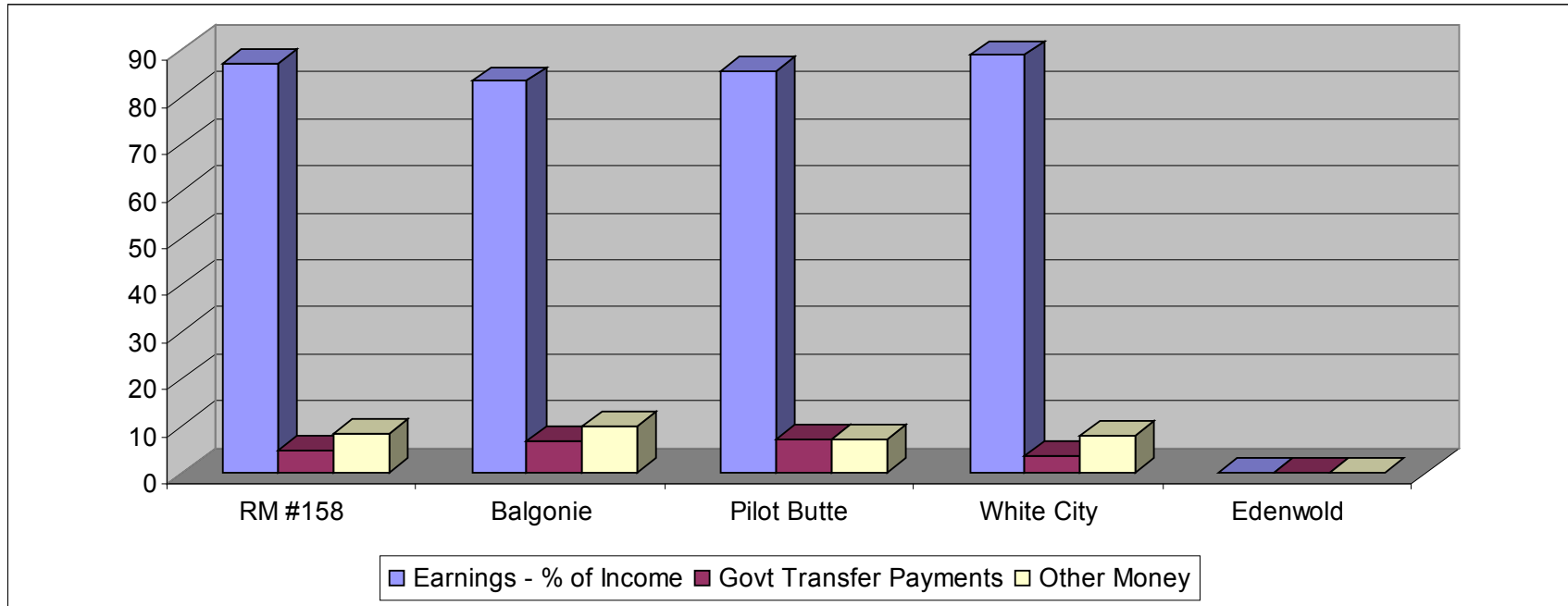
- The Study Area has the highest employment in the Other Services, followed by Business Services
- Retail and Health Care are 4th and 5th – most jobs based in Regina
- Agriculture ranks 5th for the RM of Edenwold
- Occupation Profile suggests a significant percentage of households commute to Regina for employment
- What is the retirement timeline for the Regina-based commuters? Will they stay in the Study Area after retirement?
- Is there a local Study Area requirement to increase local employment opportunities – have fewer commuters?

Labour Force Employment Status – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



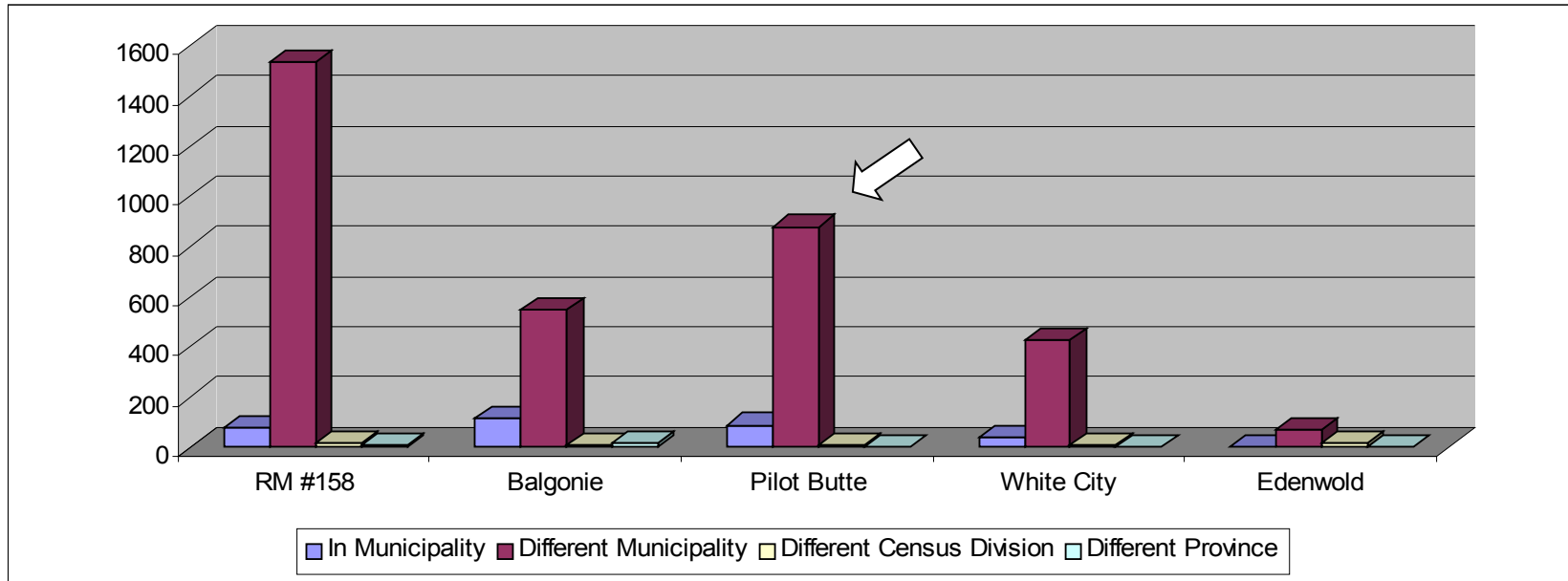
- Unemployment rate for Study Area is under 2 percent – very low levels
- Unemployment levels are low – established households with job seniority
- Most likely leave the district if unemployed
- Limited rental accommodation – need income to maintain single detached housing

Composition of Income Sources – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



- Study Area has large majority of residents with active Earnings – work force income
- Low levels of Government Transfer Payments (social assistance, unemployment, pension cheques)
- No data for Village of Edenwold
- Moderately high income levels and moderately high disposable income levels in Study Area
- What percentage of disposable income is lost to Regina and what income is spent in the Study Area?

Place of Employment – RM of Edenwold and Encompassed Urban Municipalities – 2006 Census



- The Study Area has a very large number of its Labour Force working in a different municipality (Regina)
- Very low numbers of persons working outside the Census Division or in a different province
- Study Area is in the Regina “commuter-shed” and serves as a “bedroom community” around Regina
- Does the RM of Edenwold wish to increase the number of persons working within the Study Area?
